Key Points for October

Front Cover Main Photo

This month's front cover photo was taken by Brigitta Hänggi of Men Modelling activity group members David Frost and Peter Berrie in action. This is what Peter had to say about his hobby that became a passion project:

"The model shown in the photo is the Model Airways Wright Flyer, officially recognised as the mother of all aeroplanes. Modelled to a scale of 1/16, the kit was purchased in late 2010 as the second project for Men Modelling, the first being a sailing ship. At the time the group met twice a month and had four or five members, so rather than build according to the instructions, separate tasks were allotted to each person.

Within a short time, the wings, engine, elevators and propellors had been built and all that was left to be done was to put everything together. This proved difficult for two reasons: firstly, the number of Men Modellers was reduced to only two or three in 2011 and secondly, some tasks became more difficult because parts were put together in the sequence they were completed not according to that in the instructions.

These are, of course, the challenges that make building such a model so rewarding. The instructions are, anyway, very vague in parts, so innumerable dry runs are required before a piece can be finally stuck. That's provided the glue hasn't solidified in the meantime or a tiny piece hasn't fallen on the floor. Despite such small setbacks, the pandemic and the cans of beer consumed over the years, the Flyer is nearing completion. What comes after is anyone's guess."

Farewell MyPlace



Jakob Mettler says goodbye to his role as MyPlace organiser, stepping down from the role after the last MyPlace of 2023, Canada, which took place on 30th November. Jakob has been organising My-Place since 2017 and bids a fond farewell below with a look back at the evolution of the popular talk series, some advice for future presenters and ideas for talks still waiting to happen.

"Mike Humphreys created this successful series which will have run for 8 years at the end of this year. He started with his own MyPlace, Wales, on 8th October 2015.

At the end of 2015 and during 2016 there were MyPlaces on The Arctic, Albania & Greece, Romania, Iran, the Alps, Indian Food, My Cruise Ship, Colombia and Australia.

When Mike left for home, I took over and have enjoyed a good run with many interesting MyPlaces. Even during Covid, the Zoom MyPlaces went well because we were presenting to a small audience of people we knew.

My first MyPlace was my own Switzerland, specifically Swiss History on 11th May 2017. The following MyPlaces took place while I was in charge:

- 2017 Japan, South Africa, Argentina
- 2018 Scotland, Afghanistan, Russia, Mexico
- 2019 Pakistan, The Basque Country, Liverpool, Middle Germany/Frankfurt, Brazil
- 2020 Panama and Ukraine (both zoomed), Philippines, Hong Kong
- 2021 Swiss History (again), Turkey, New Zealand (all zoomed)
- 2022 No MyPlaces this difficult year because recruiting new speakers during Covid was impossible

• 2023 Emilia-Romagna (Italy), Pittsburgh, Scotland (again), Peru and ending with Canada (30th November)

Many interesting MyPlaces indeed (over 30) and presented in many different ways, but when the subject is your home country or favourite subject, always from the heart.

Let me end by thanking all the presenters - ladies and gentlemen and couples who got up there and talked about TheirPlace. The English wasn't always perfect, but they all did a great job with information and sometimes afterwards with drinks or snacks from there.

I also want to thank my team, especially Debbie and Penny without whom these events couldn't have run so smoothly and the others who jumped in to help when needed.

It would be great if the series could continue. There are still many countries represented at Centrepoint which have not been presented (see below). It has been difficult, even after Covid is over, to find people willing to get up and talk about TheirPlace.

Future Presenters

Your English doesn't have to be perfect. You can talk about your town or favourite place if a country is too much. You are proud of YourPlace, so it will be easy. Just step up and give it a go. It is very interesting for the other Centrepoint members to hear about where you come from.

Future Presentations

On 26th October 2023, a special cultural celebration between the Basel and the Ukraine communities took place at the GGG West Library. I helped host the Ukrainian Initiative Team from Centrepoint to support my motherland, Ukraine.

One of the best Ukrainian quartets, the Lviv Virtuosos, was invited to perform. It was the best way to show the richness of Ukrainian culture and traditions through music and folklore songs. Lviv Virtuosos are well known in the ancient city of Lviv and have represented our country in prestigious concert halls around the world. In view of this fact, you will not find a better match to feel the Ukrainian spirit. It rained that evening, but I noticed that many people outside who were just passing by the library stopped for a moment to listen and watch the performance.

During the musical intervals, we heard some Ukrainian fairy tales translated

into English and read by Jeanne Darling, which gave me a moment to forget about all the problems and return to my childhood. It was surprising to find out that the well-known "The Legend of the Christmas Spider" had been turned into a Ukrainian fairy tale.

Afterwards everyone was invited to try Ukrainian food. Before I had been asked to cook something Ukrainian and guess to whom I reached out for advice? Of course, my mother, who shared with me her recipe "Vognuk". Centrepoint member Yana Mironov made "Vinegret" and Maria Ladmann brought Spanish "Empanadas" which were both incredibly delicious.

It was funny during the evening to hear different names for the same dish: "Ogonek", "Jewish snack" and "Namazka". What really made me happy was that people came and told me that the taste made them feel like they were back home. That was probably the most valuable comment for me since we are far from our native cities and separated from our families. This feeling meant a lot to me.

I reached out to one of the musicians to thank them for the performance and I found out that we also were both from the same city - Kharkiv. He had performed in the Kharkiv Opera House and had come especially from Düsseldorf to perform at our event in Basel!

Overall, it was a great evening that gave us Ukrainians the feeling of being at home

and showed the beauty and richness of Ukrainian culture to the audience. About 60 people, including the superb musicians and volunteers, participated in the evening. Many attendees eagerly wore solidarity ribbons displaying the Ukrainian and Swiss colours which were created by Jan Hawley and made available for the event. Vivian Beetle, who also helped organise the event, unfortunately could not be present.

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank you to my mother, Elena, for her delicious recipe (see page 24), which was a great success. I am also tremendously thankful to Centrepoint and the GGG West Library, in particular Nicole Scoles and Karin Minssen. Sadly, the war in Ukraine is not over and this event is a reminder that Ukraine still needs continuous support.

Event Reports

WWF Climate Change Talk

On the evening of Thursday 5th October, Jack Church of World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) International Volunteers gave a talk on climate change to a packed audience in the Centrepoint library.

Jack's expertise on the climate crisis enthralled us all. He presented one information-packed diagram after another on how global heating has arisen, how we know, what we must do about it and the consequences if we don't. Many revelations were discomforting. Switzerland is not escaping the climate crisis as is illustrated by its fast-melting glaciers. Furthermore, the richest 10% of the people in the world cause 50% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions. And who are those 10%? Anyone with a yearly income over CHF 23,000. Yes, yearly.

Jack showed how our environmental impact falls into two categories: personal choices and systems. We were invited to look at our personal choices by completing WWF's questionnaire to work out our carbon footprints*. This led to more unpleasant surprises, for me, at least. I thought I lived carefully, but apparently my CO₂ emissions equivalent is 7 tonnes per year. Of course, there is only so much an individual can do. In Switzerland about the best one can do is to reduce one's emissions to 4 tonnes. Remembering of course that our goal is 0 tonnes.

That led us to the matter that systems need changing. For example, Basel's district heating is not as carbon neutral as we like to think. With cars, we need to think beyond the individual vehicles' emissions and look at emissions of the entire system, including the roads. And will electric cars reduce traffic jams?

So far, so bad. But Jack was upbeat. There is still time to rescue ourselves, although not much.

Jack's talk left us in no doubt that climate change is a huge and complicated subject. But the take-home message was very clear: it's real, it's bad and we need to act drastically and urgently. But we can, and we know how to. Stop burning fossil fuels, stop methane-producing activities and take the CO_2 we've put into the air back out.

Prix schappo BRIGITTA HÄNGGI

The Prix schappo is awarded twice a year to associations or groups that do something for others and show exceptional voluntary commitment to promoting the quality of life in Basel. Centrepoint won the Prix schappo award six years ago.

On 2nd November 2023, the 51st Prix schappo was awarded to the CURA Encounter Centre. In his address Beat Jans, President of the Government, said: "with schappo, the Canton of Basel-Stadt takes its hat off to voluntary and community commitments with exemplary character and especially honours the volunteers."

CURA was launched in 2020 with Claraspital as the driving force and broadbased sponsorship. The starting point was the realisation that many patients are left to their own devices after an inpatient hospital stay. CURA offers a lowthreshold oasis with a colourful range of services and activities for the mind, body, soul and spirit. Without coercion, without registration and without obligation.

"At CURA, people find distance from their fears and hardships," said Denise Moser, member of the schappo expert commission. In addition to a core team of professionals, eleven volunteers are involved in CURA. They ensure smooth daily operations and create an informal atmosphere for encounters.

Basel Essentials

More Conservative, Less Green; The Swiss Had Their Say BRIGITTA HÄNGGI

With a voter turnout of 46.6 %, Federal elections were held in Switzerland on 22nd October 2023. Every four years the Swiss elect or re-elect all members of the National Council (Nationalrat) and Council of States (Ständerat). These elections will be followed on 13th December 2023 by the full Parliament electing the Federal Council (Bundesrat), Switzerland's government and collegial presidency.

Instability in many parts of the world seemed to influence Swiss voters with concerns about rising immigration outweighing those about the environment, as reflected in the final results. Many people voted for parties which promised security, order and a strong state.

National Council

The big winner overall was the right-wing People's Party (SVP) with the Greens (GRÜNE Schweiz) and Liberal Greens (GLP) suffering major setbacks. Forecasters had predicted that the Conservative Party (SVP) would gain votes. Their campaign slogans promised more security and focused strongly on migration and refugee movements which made many voters turn more conservative throughout Switzerland. They ended up with 28.6% of the voter share, the second-best result in the party's history.

The left, the Social Democrats (SP), also gained but more modestly. They addressed issues like the loss of purchasing power and the costs of rent, health insurance and daycare. Their voter share was 18.3%.

In general, parties which addressed concrete concerns and promised solutions were able to increase their share of the electorate.

Because neither the right nor the left camp would stand to have a majority in the future, the real winner was not the SVP. Even though the Centre (Mitte) Party gained only one seat, it was poised to have the most important role to play - that of determining the majority in the National Council.

These results were true until Wednesday when big headlines proclaimed that the federal government had miscalculated. The Federal Statistical Office (FSO) said Sunday's results - 14.6% for the Centre Party and 14.4% for the Radical-Liberals (FDP) - were wrong. The Radical-Liberals in fact got 14.3% and the Centre Party 14.1%.

The Mitte no longer was in the position of determining the majority with its 14.1%. The FDP will again be the third largest party. There were also slight adjustments in the other parties' results, although they did not change the ranking.

The newly elected parliament is more right-wing and less green although according to post-election surveys, voters still expect social problems to be fixed and a move forward with the country's energy transition. The National Council became a little younger on Sunday. Whereas the average age was previously 51.7 years, it is now 49.5 years.

Basel-Stadt stands out in particular. For the first time in its history, the Canton is sending an all-woman delegation to the Federal Parliament. Four previous female National Council members managed to be re-elected while Mustafa Atici (SP) lost his re-election bid for the lower house. Basel-Stadt had lost one National Council seat because of redistribution. The four successful incumbents are Sarah Wyss (SP), Patricia von Falkenstein (LDP), Sibel Arslan (Greens/Basta) and Katja Christ (GLP). Eva Herzog (SP) achieved the best result in 40 years in the elections for the Council of States.

Satisfaction for Eva Herzog

Incumbent Councilwomen Eva Herzog (SP) will continue to represent the canton of Basel-Stadt in the Council of States. Her conservative challengers had no chance. Herzog ultimately garnered 42,677 votes, more votes than anyone else in 40 years.

"For me, today is a day of joy," said Herzog. In December 2022 Herzog had been on the verge of crowning her political career: She was considered the clear favourite in the race to succeed SP Federal Councillor Simonetta Sommaruga. In the end, she lost but kept her seat in the Council of States in Bern. Herzog will now achieve a coronation after all. In December 2023 she is expected to be elected President of the Council of States - a gratifying alternative to not being elected to the Federal Council. Herzog will continue to be one of the most influential players in Swiss financial and fiscal policy over the next four years.

Watch out for news of the outcome of December's election of a Federal Councillor in the February Horizon edition.

The Price of Success

S unday 22nd October saw the completion of the first round of the Swiss Super League with FC Basel firmly anchored at the bottom of the table, four points adrift of their nearest rivals. Even if they win their match in hand against FC Lugano, the club will still be seven points behind a position in the upper half of the table, which would ensure that they do not have to be part of the relegation round in the final five matches of the season.

Until that time there are 66 points to be won, so although things look black at the moment, there is still time to get them right. But what went wrong?

Back in June the club appointed a new trainer, Timo Schultz, who trained St Pauli, Hamburg, for two and a half years before being sacked in December 2022, when the club was facing relegation from the second German league. After "long and serious consideration", FC Basel saw Schultz as the ideal man to lead them back to the top of the table.

When Schultz signed, Basel had just completed a motley season, just scraping fifth position in the league, but with a fantastic run from second qualifying round to the semi-final of the Europa Conference League. It was clear that this success would bring in offers from bigger clubs -Basel has always let players go - but losing nine good players before the summer transfer window closed meant that the team had to be rebuilt. The last three, including two strong midfielders, went after the season had started, making the task even more difficult as potential replacements were already out on loan.

In his explanation of Schultz's dismissal, St Pauli's chairman described the latter's match plan as "hope plus a striker". Thierry Barry has proven to be a striker who can win a high ball, but where it goes afterwards is unpredictable. In addition, there is seldom a midfielder following up behind him. The current wingers don't go for the byline but rather pass back early, taking the pressure off the opposing defence.

Basel's own defence look solid at times, but not solid enough to hold a 1-0 lead. This is not helped by the Jöggeli crowd whistling when possession is held - my memories of Leeds United in their halcyon days have the crowd cheering and counting every successful pass. This pressure to always attack leads to the full backs moving too far up field, leaving the defence vulnerable to counterattacks. It

was this that led to the 1-1 draw against Luzern, a match that should have been won, and where Basel finally began to look like a team.

Unfortunately, the FCB powers that be decided otherwise. Schultz was dismissed after the match and an unhappy Heiko Vogel* took over again as team manager. The match against Stade Lausanne-Ouchy three days later showed what team


spirit and a strong midfield (led by Basel loan Emmanuel Essiam) can do, as Basel were sunk O-3. The crowd actually applauded the last goal.

Is there anything positive to say? Well, Portuguese U21 defensive midfield player Renato Veiga looks well worth his transfer fee - he just needs to find a reliable partner in the offensive midfield (oldies Xhaka and Frey are more defensive). Finn van Breeman at centre-half also looks good at times. If Barry learns how to control the ball and pass accurately, he will definitely be an asset. For the general situation, a couple of wins would probably be enough to change the team's fortunes - the potential is there.

Yesterday morning my wife rang up and told me about a dream she had just before she awoke. It took place in a railway station "with lots of lines" and I was there "playing a positive role".

"Was I the engine driver?", I asked.

Just what the role was she could not say, but I must admit that I would have liked to have been the engine driver of her dreams. As a small boy, becoming an engine driver was the answer I gave to anyone who asked what I wanted to be when I grew up. It was also the answer that most of my peers would have given. Railways played a major role in small-boy life.

Just why I find railways so fascinating is hard to say. It might have started with my father playing cricket on Saturdays for Slazengers. Their cricket field was next to Horbury cutting and at any sign of an approaching train, a crowd of small boys would rush to the fence to spot the number.

Then there were the Wolf Cubs - the weekly meeting finished around 7:45, just time enough to grab threepenny-worth of chips before rushing to see the "ten-past eighter" steam locomotive race through Horbury & Ossett station behind Jubilee Classes "Mars" 45698, "Dauntless" 45717 and "Glorious" 45719 or the unnamed "Patriot" 45517.

With the railway nearby, it wasn't long before whole Saturday afternoons were spent trainspotting. At first the numbers were put in a small red book, then, after saving several weeks' pocket money, came the moment when I bought my first lan Allen ABC of British Locomotives - for the North Eastern Region. Imagine my disappointment on getting home and opening it to find that none of the numbers I had collected were in it. My numbers started with 4 or 5 and all the numbers in the ABC started with 6!

A quick consultation with a couple of older boys revealed that in order to see the "sixers" I had to go to Wakefield Westgate. This involved taking the bus, which I was allowed to do in the company of a friend. What a difference to the Calder valley line, which was predominantly freight. Here we had the Kings Cross-Leeds expresses and the highlight of every afternoon, the up and down "Queen of Scots" Pullman. It was here that I fell in love with all things LNER (London North Eastern Railway).

Another "must" in small-boy life in the 1950s was the train set. I got one for Christmas at the age of five and have had one ever since. It grew piece by piece on birthdays and Christmas and, as I entered adolescence, by Airfix kits that I assembled myself. In 1960, I decided to exchange my weekly Eagle magazine for the monthly Railway Modeller, 63 years of which now adorn my bookshelves.

Model railways have also kept me firmly in their grip. It's probably because they need a combination of skills to make a good model. The manual work involved and the problem solving that comes with it is a good counterbalance to more intellectual pursuits such as scientific research, translating or technical writing. I assembled my first locomotive kit and scratch-built my first wagon at university.

When I first came to Germany in 1973, I bought my first N gauge¹ locomotives, two BR-outline Minitrix locomotives. N gauge was new at the time and offered a railway in minimum space. My first N gauge layout had to wait, however, until my wife and I returned to Stuttgart in 1978. My collection then started to grow, but mostly through second-hand purchases at local toy markets.

It was only after arriving in Lörrach in 1990 that my modelling career really took off. I joined an N gauge group, the "N'ler in Dreiländereck", which wanted to build modules, get together four or five times a year at weekends and run trains to its heart's content. This, plus exhibiting, we have been doing for the past 33 years. In that time, I have built 22 modules, including two stations, one of which I sold. A number of these modules form a permanent layout in my cellar - moving house some years ago merely involved rearranging the modules to suit the available space.

My interest in railways has also brought with it a number of friends and acquaintances. At the recent Eimeldingen secondhand Börse I met not only fellow N'Iers, but also the BLS² engine driver who showed us around the Basel loco shed - and allowed us to drive a loco up and down the track outside the SBB - as well as a Frenchman, who helps organise the Bartenheim model railway show.

And my interest in full scale railways has not waned over the years. Nowadays it is the unusual things that catch the eye. For instance, the brown BLS locomotives that have been hanging around the Basel Badischer Bahnhof for the last couple of weeks, despite the fact they are supposed to be mothballed, or the Rheingold express locomotive, which should really be in a museum in Konstanz.

On my many journeys to Freiburg I watch the progress of the new line between Basel and Müllheim. Back at home I don't need a watch, only the S5 and S6 passing my window. And the treat of the week is the midday Tuesday to Thursday log train, which can vary between a locomotive alone to a collection of five wagons. Yes, railways have a lot to offer the enthusiast and can be a rewarding hobby for an entire lifetime. Back in 1952, I was certainly on the right track.

¹ N gauge is a set of standards used in railway modelling to define the distance between two rails, referred to as the gauge. The 'N' stems from the distance of nine millimetres between rails.

² BLS written in full is the Berner Alpenbahn Gesellschaft Bern-Lötschberg-Simplon. It is one of the "big" rail companies of Switzerland.

Swiss' Favourite Hobbies ALISON WATERFIELD



t's no secret that the Swiss work a lot but what do they actually do on their days off or after work? With the aim to find some concrete data, I started with a google search (as you do!). I came across Statista (statista.com), a leading online statistics portal that integrates statistical data on over 80,000 topics from more than 22,500 sources. Luckily data for my specific search ("Switzerland's favourite hobbies") was available for me to view.

Statista conducted an online survey on the subject of "Most popular hobbies and activities" with a total of 7,804 respondents in Switzerland aged between 18-64 years old during the time period July 2022 to June 2023. The specific survey question I am interested in was phrased as "What are your personal hobbies and activities?"

Travelling was the most popular answer with a 41% share of respondents, closely followed, as one would expect, by outdoor activities (39%). The top five answers in fact all cluster closely within 10% of the top answer; in descending order from third to fifth place: cooking / baking (38%), socialising (38%) and reading (37%). Doing sports and fitness came in in sixth place (27%), followed by pets (27%), tech/computers (24%), gardening and plants (23%) and video gaming (23%) in tenth place.

Most popular hobbies and activities in Switzerland as of June 2023 (Statista. com) How do the Swiss cohort's answers compare to those of its bordering neighbours, other European countries and those from other countries around the globe? I browsed some of the openly accessible data on the top two hobbies given in respective surveys carried out by Statista in 2023.

Our only close neighbour with outdoor activities in a top two spot is Austria - as might be expected. In France, cooking/ baking took the top spot (as I would expect, France being the country of gastronomy), while the Germans seem to enjoy socialising the most and the Italians travelling.

Travelling, socialising, cooking/baking and reading score highly in other European countries, as well as in the US, Canada and Australia. Travelling and reading dominate the top two activities in most of the Asian countries I could find data for, with the exception of China which has outdoor activities and sports and fitness in its top two. Tech/computers comes in second place in Nigeria, Egypt and Turkey and first in Brazil. Otherwise the usual suspects reading, travelling and cooking/ baking again feature in the top two.

It is clear to see that there is significant overlap in the top hobbies and activities of individuals in every country around the world no matter the location. What are your favourite hobbies?!

What's in a Phrase?

hen I heard that the theme of this edition of Horizon was to be "hobbies" one phrase immediately came into my mind: "to get on one's hobbyhorse". This phrase is used to describe someone who is obsessed with a particular topic and who tends to talk about it excessively, often to the annovance of others! For example, it could be used to describe someone who is passionate about their personal hobby, say stamp collecting, and bores other (less interested) people by constantly talking about stamps! The phrase dates from the 17th century when a popular children's toy was the hobbyhorse (a stick with a model horse's head on one end which children would pretend to ride). Thus, when someone talks incessantly about their favourite topic it is thought that they gain a similar level of enjoyment as a child does riding their hobbyhorse.

There are so many hobbies aren't there? And, as the saying goes, **"one man's meat is another man's poison"**, i.e., what one person enjoys or values, another person may not. This phrase is very old indeed. It was first published in English in an autobiography by the English composer Thomas Whythorne in 1576 but the Roman poet and philosopher Titus Lucretius Carus (known as Lucretius) used the same phrase (though obviously in Latin!) in the first century BC.

Many people collect things as a hobby - stamps, coins, vintage cars, etc. - and

they always want to collect things that are in "mint condition", i.e., in perfect condition. The first recorded use of the phrase dates back to the 1540s when it was used by workers in coin production facilities (known as "mints") to describe coins which had just been stamped but had yet to be used. The phrase extended from coins to stamps, and by the 1920s it was used to describe any second-hand/ used items that had been well-maintained. How many items do you see advertised on eBay as in "mint condition"?!

Fishing or angling is another popular hobby, i.e., using a fishing rod to catch fish in a sea, lake or river. However, those who don't like the hobby of fishing may still **"fish for compliments"**, a phrase in popular usage by the late 1700s meaning to attempt to gain praise and reassurance from someone by pretending to be modest or by saying negative things about oneself. The person seeking to be praised (the fisherman) uses false modesty (bait) to gain praise (the fish)!

Those who read for a hobby literally read the words of a book but sometimes, if the storyline is particularly complicated, they may also need to "read between the lines". This phrase, meaning to understand something which isn't obvious or explicitly stated, is derived from a form of cryptography in which confidential messages were hidden between lines of text. By the mid-18th century, the phrase was being used to describe being able to understand the meaning of any unclear form of communication. A good example of needing to read between the lines is when someone (often British) says that something is "interesting" (is it really interesting or is it not?!!).

Do you play a musical instrument as a hobby? I used to play the flute. I was pretty good even though I don't like to "blow my own trumpet". This phrase means to boast about one's skills or achievements and appears to be derived from the practice in medieval times of announcing the arrival of an important guest at a formal gathering with a fanfare of horns. The idea is that a truly important person is recognised by others and is heralded, while a self-important person remains unrecognised by others and must therefore blow his own trumpet. In American English I believe a phrase with a similar meaning is "to toot your own horn".

Let me finish this article with a phrase taken from the hobby of baking which I hope you will agree is "the icing on the cake". Covering cakes in icing was introduced into baking in the 1600s. At that time, sugar was very expensive. To have a cake was already a treat and if icing was added it was even more special. So, the phrase to put "icing on the cake" came to be used to refer to something that enhanced or improved an already positive situation though it can also be used in a sarcastic manner meaning that something bad has been added to an already bad situation. In this particular context I will leave it to the reader to interpret whether this last paragraph really was "the icing on the cake" (good or bad)!

Recipe of the Month

I made this recipe for the recent GGG event celebrating the Basel Ukraine community and due to popular demand share the recipe with you all here. It is my mother's recipe and I hope you enjoy it!

Servings: 8 Preparation Time: 30 min

Ingredients

- 200g block of processed cheese (Schmelzkäse), pre-frozen for 20 min (to make grating easier)
- 3 large eggs (or 4 medium)
- 2 garlic cloves, pressed
- 2 tbsp mayonnaise
- Ground pepper mix pinch, to taste
- Salt pinch, to taste

Instructions

Hard-boil the eggs for approximately 10 minutes. Let them cool, then peel and grate them on a medium-sized grater. Grate the cheese.

In a salad bowl combine the grated eggs and cheese with the pressed garlic and mayonnaise, then lightly season with salt and pepper. Mix everything thoroughly.


Adjust the consistency and seasoning to your liking. If the mixture is a bit dry, add a little more mayonnaise to it. The mixture is now ready to serve. Serve immediately or store mixture in an airtight container in the fridge for up to 3 days.

Serving Suggestions

Serve immediately, garnished with olives and sprigs of herbs, for example dill.

Serve on slices of fresh or fried bread, slices of crackers or fresh vegetables, tomatoes, cucumbers, bell peppers, etc.

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




